From the Introduction:

Seek:

- 1) Pythagoras once stated, “Silence is better than unmeaning words.” Do you agree with his statement? Why/Why not?

- 2) If someone offered to record even your most idle (not intimate) conversations and play them back to you, how comfortable would you be in what you would hear?

Share:

- 1) Reread John 1:1-5 (Focus on verse 4).
 - a) Pastor Mark stated, “The term “life” (Gr., *zōē*) is uniformly used throughout the Gospel. Wherever it appears, it refers either to the principle of physical life (vitality) or, most often, to spiritual life.” Why is it important for us to see Jesus, as the Word, giver of life?

- b) How important is it to you that Jesus brings you new life physically and spiritually?
- 2) Read James 3:8-10
- a) In this passage, James addresses the words we use, referring to them as “a restless evil, full of deadly poison” (v. 8). Do you agree with James’ statement? Why/why not?

 - b) What steps do you need to take to honor God with your words? NOTE: This may present itself positively or negatively. The key focus is honoring Him.

Serve:

- 1) How does it make you feel to know that God sent Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, to bring salvation to all?
- 2) What changes need to take place in your life in order to honor God with your words and serve Him?

Prayer:

Pray together, using sentence prayers, thanking God for sending His Son, to save you. Also, ask Him to help you honor “Hos Word” through your words.
